Library Receives Bainbridge Community Foundation Grant



Bainbridge Public Library was recently awarded a \$10,000 grant from the Bainbridge Community Foundation through its 2016 Community Grants Cycle. The grant will be used for construction of new booths equipped with sound-canceling technology. These amenities will offer patrons much-needed quiet spaces to work, study and meet in small groups. The Bainbridge Community Foundation achieved an all-time record high of \$243,661 in funding to benefit more than 50 local nonprofits this year through the annual Community Grants Cycle.

Bold Beauties Shine in Summer By Ann Lovejoy

In high summer, plants that stand up to heat and drought are stars of the Library borders. The showiest of these are not modern border beauties but old-fashioned perennials that came west with the pioneers. Perhaps the most vivid is a perennial sunflower, Helianthus Lemon Queen.

This Midwestern native reaches 6-8 feet high, topped with sheaves of sparkling, sunny yellow



flowers from midsummer into autumn. It thrives in dry, poor soils and tolerates morning shade, though afternoon shade makes it tipsy. It also flops if fed, but remains sturdily upright in lean soils. Equally tall if softer in coloration is Joe-Pye weed (*Eupatorium* sp.), another bold beauty with forms that range from 2-8 feet high. Though most garden versions hail from the American East, some species range into British Columbia. Ours is the form called

Gateway, a tall and particularly robust form which revels in full sun but tolerates light shade. It does best when it gets a modicum of summer water, but if well mulched (we use coarse bark chips), it takes dry summers in stride. Along the library's parking lot fence, you'll notice a mid-range perennial, *Anemone japonica*. These prolific bloomers pour out cascades of white, pink, or rosy blossoms from midsummer into autumn, scoffing at shade, sun, and poor soil alike. It is worth noting that plants that can thrive in tough conditions can go wild in good ones. Lusty plants like these are best used in large gardens where the will to roam is an asset.
