Can you feel it? We can 1! With the official arrival of Spring and daylight that lasts into early evening, it's an exciting and busy time! High on our list of activities upon which to report are the new Haiku Garden entry arches ... no, they're not in yet, but the not-so-sexy, but critically important foundations and anchoring systems have been installed. While the concrete cures, we're planning and preparing for the installation of the arches ... it's getting closer 1!





Volunteer extraordinaire, John van den Meerendonk, empties one of 20-something barrels of concrete into one of the four, 30-inch-deep holes that were hand-excavated for the foundations.

The four, custom-fabricated anchoring brackets were carefully positioned to accept the legs of the arches when they are installed.



Friends of the Library




During the time the library is not open to the public, the Friends of the Library are unable to hold our normal book sales. However, our "Buy a Bag of Books" plan is in full swing! Books are packed by FOL volunteers into a paper shopping bag and sealed by taping or by stapling the bag closed with the genre contents written on the outside. The bags of books are available for pickup Monday through Saturday, 10 AM to 1 PM. They are located under the awning by the Children's Library entrance. Access is from the Children's Library parking lot facing High School Rd. Each bag of books is priced at \$5.00. You can pay online by clicking here and making a donation to the Bainbridge Friends of the Library for the number of bags you want to purchase. Leave a note with the online donation indicating when you would like to pick up your bag(s). The bag(s) will be waiting with your name written on it. You can also just drop by and select one or more bags and pay in cash or by check. If you pay online, you can leave a note requesting a specific genre if you wish. Your custom selection will be waiting with your name on the bag. Pre-selected bags are labeled by genre and available on the cart outside.

Also, magazines are being accepted again!....any flavor, any year!



Have You Seen This Library?



This library certainly has the "WOW" factor. It stops tourists in their tracks! It is the Halifax Central Library located on the corner of Spring Garden Road and Queen Street in Downtown Halifax, Nova Scotia. After several decades of discussion, the planning of this stunning building began in 2008. The architects, a joint venture between local firm Fowler Bauld and Mitchell and Schmidt Hammer Lassen of Denmark, were chosen in 2010 through an international design competition. Construction began later that year on a prominent downtown site that had been a parking lot for half a century. The new library opened in December 2014 and has become a highly popular gathering place. In addition to a book collection significantly larger than that of the former library, the new building houses a wide range of amenities including cafés, an auditorium, and community rooms. The striking architecture is characterized by the fifth floor's cantilever over the entrance plaza, a central atrium crisscrossed by staircases, and the building's transparency and relationship to the urban setting. The library won a Lieutenant Governor's Design Award in Architecture for 2014 and a Governor General's Medal in Architecture in 2016.

The Narrowboat Summer By Anne Youngson

Eve has just left a thirty-year corporate career; Sally has just walked away from an unfulfilling marriage and Anastasia must move from her narrowboat on Britain's famed canal system for medical treatment. They meet by chance, rushing to rescue Noah, Anastasia's dog. Their personalities could not be more different, but the life challenges each is facing are very similar. To all three their decision makes perfect sense. Sally and Eve will spend six weeks moving the narrowboat through the canals for a haul-out and servicing and Anastasia will recuperate in Eve's flat. Their experiences are instructive, heartwarming, and transformative. If you have watched any episodes of Narrowboat Journeys or Cruising the Cut from the BBC, you will immediately recognize the long tunnels and adorable countryside. Following Youngson's hugely popular Meet Me at the Museum, this is a charming, well-crafted, feel-good story perfectly suited for either beach chair or cozy fireside.
