

Art in the Library!

Happy New Year! Start 2023 out with art for your eyes in a creative exhibit by our January artist, Jon Waters. Jon will host a First Friday opening reception for his exhibit titled "Confabulated Plebeians" (full title to be disclosed on opening night) on January 6, from 5-7PM in the library meeting room.

"This revolutionary art incorporates the latest advances in artificial intelligence technology into its creative process, using massive AI models with billions of parameters, diffusion models, and chaotic combinatorials of language to visualize and generate ideas. This approach allows for the continuous refinement and evolution of initial creations, leading to the manifestation of specific goals and concepts of the artist. Sometimes, however, the artist may simply want to see where the AI's creations lead without any specific goal in mind."



"Jon has a natural inclination towards art that explores this and other complex relationships between humanity and technology, as well as the implications of artificial intelligence for consciousness and the nature of existence. His work often engages with themes related to the merging of human and machine, the possibilities of life after death, and the nature of reality itself. In many ways, his art can be seen as a reflection of the profound questions raised by science fiction classics like The Matrix and The Truman Show, as they explore the idea that we are constantly being watched and controlled by unseen forces."



Showcasing Our Local Authors! Ann Lovejoy



In the early 1980s, when the style of most horticultural writing was formal and rather stiff, I was approached by Steve Lorton, then an editor for Sunset Magazine. After walking past my tiny Capitol Hill Garden, he suggested that I approach the Seattle Weekly, as the editors were looking for a gardening columnist. He also told me "Write just like you talk," and I took that advice. Within a year, I was invited by editors at Sasquatch Books, the Weekly's book publishing branch, to submit a collection of 52 essays on gardening. That book, The Year in Bloom, won the Governor's Book Award and an invitation to write for the Seattle PI and Horticulture magazine, among many others.

In 1985, we bought a venerable old farmhouse on Bainbridge with a huge garden, providing me with endless topics for magazine and newspaper

articles and books. Among my favorites were Fragrance in Bloom, a handbook on growing scented plants, and the Fresh from The Garden cookbook. A contribution to Gardens of The World, a companion volume to the PBS series, sent me on a dream trip to England to interview (and stay with!) the most famous gardeners of the day. Some 30 books and countless speaking engagements later, I'm happily retired, writing garden columns for the Kitsap Sun, a weekly blog (Green Gardening with Ann Lovejoy), and contributing to the Bainbridge Island Senior Community Center's Splash! newsletter.



Bainbridge is home to many distinguished and hugely popular authors. In this column, we will profile a local author each month. Many will already be favorites, but we may just introduce you to a new author whose profile will send you right to the library to pick up a new read! Happy reading and thank you to Delight Willing for her assistance!

Have You Seen This Library?



The Man Who Died By Antti Tuomainen

Scandinavian noir (think Stieg Larsson, Jo Nesbø, Arnaldur Indriðason, Jussi Adler-Olsen) is typically full of harsh language, brooding landscapes, disturbing hyperviolence, multiple violations against humanity, and torturously flawed central characters. But think again! Jaakko Kaunismaa, a 37-year-old mushroom entrepreneur, is told by his doctor that he is dying. His body is full of deadly toxins indicative of slow and intentional poisoning. As he comes to terms with this diagnosis, his life takes several more unexpected turns. As he grapples with his mortality, he is determined to solve this ultimate mystery. Who wants him dead? Why? How did they do it? How long does he have to find out? A significant part of Jaakko's journey is pure comedy; he encounters infidelity, competitors in the mushroom industry who are determined to kill him with giant swords and finds himself in several misadventures involving burying bodies, losing his clothes, and a whole lot more. This is an amazingly funny, tender, poignant, thoughtful, and hugely entertaining story by the award-winning king of Finnish Noir -- easily read in a single sitting!


