One of our earliest memories of growing up in Los Angeles – and certainly one of the most treasured – was our weekly trip to the Palms Library. Compared to libraries today, it was small and dark. The children's section was on the left and my sister and I were allowed to take out 10 books a week. How we looked forward to library day when we'd stop on the way home from

school and be allowed to read and browse until we'd chosen the week's supply of books. Margot and I both started reading at an early age and quickly moved to the adult, i.e. no pictures, book section. East of the Sun and West of the Moon and The Blue Fairy Tale Book were favorites, along with the Greek and Roman myths. To this day, both of us are avid readers and a trip to the library – or the local bookstore – remains a treat.

Our mother, Helen Monnette Amestoy, was a voracious reader and always had a book by her bedside and a different one in her purse. She read whenever she could steal a moment - while the gas station attendant was filling the tank, or she was waiting in line at the bank. While we were in high school, she went back to school and was a graduate of UCLA's first library school class.

Her career spanned 25 years with the Los Angeles County Public Library, the last 22 as Senior Librarian in Charge of one of the branch libraries. On her retirement she was honored formally with a congressional salute and a commendation from the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors recognizing her as a model and inspiration, an outstanding community leader, who was professionally distinguished at the state and national level and honored to be named as the Los Angeles County Public "Librarian of the Year."

When we think of Momie, as we called her, we think of books and vice versa, so leaving a growing legacy to the Bainbridge Library was an obvious and pleasurable way to honor her memory.

Showcasing Our Local Authors! Paul Merriman



We are fortunate to have Paul Merriman, a nationally recognized authority on personal finance, live and teach on Bainbridge Island. Paul has written a number of books on personal financial management, and he's had a PBS special "Financial Fitness after 50." He continues his efforts in financial education. Here on our island, he has given several different series of courses, and his next one runs from March 30 through April. To continue his commitment to sharing his knowledge about finance, Paul offers us free copies of his "We're Talking Millions."

"How investing really works:

Most people I talk to about investing think the results they get will depend on the market. Mostly, they are wrong.

Sure, the market will make a difference. But your ultimate results will depend mostly on what you do and what you don't do.

Your habits and the way you manage your emotions and expectations are the key.

The most successful investors I know make it a point of pride to regularly save money and spend less than they could spend. They don't expect miraculous stock-market returns to make up for their own lack of planning or discipline.

They are careful to ignore the constant messages from Wall Street and the financial media suggesting that financial nirvana is right over the horizon if you only have the right stock, the right fund, the right manager.

Perhaps most powerful of all, successful investors understand some gradeschool math: The sooner you start saving money, the better your results will be.

When I talk to people who want to improve their investment returns, here are four of the things I recommend most often. Each one is what I call a million-dollar decision.

ONE: Reduce your routine investment expenses. This is easy (see #3 below) and guaranteed to improve your return.

TWO: Reduce your taxes. For many people, this is also easy (see #3 below). And this is guaranteed to leave more of your returns for you.

THREE: Ditch actively managed funds and instead invest in low-cost index funds. This lets you inexpensively and easily own a slice of everything that's in "the market."

FOUR: Add equities. Replacing even 10% of your portfolio with a small-cap value fund can boost your lifetime return by \$1 million or more – especially if you start early.




It is the main library of Oslo Public Library! The library originally opened on 12 January 1785 following an endowment from Carl Deichman, who also bequeathed 7,000 books and 150 manuscripts which formed the basis of the library's collection. The library's new main building, Deichman Bjørvika, is in the Bjørvika district of Oslo, next to the Opera and the new Munch Museum, part of the Fjord City renewal project. It was designed by architectural firms Lundhagem and Atelier Oslo Deichman Bjørvika opened to the public on 18 June 2020. Deichman Bjørvika has won several awards, including the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions / Systematic Public Library of the Year award. The building will also hold manuscripts contributed to the Future Library project, among them texts by Margaret Atwood and David Mitchell.

It employs over 300 people, and the public library system has over 20 branches throughout the city. Registered users may use the library every day, even when it is not staffed, from 7am to 11pm. It is also possible to borrow and return books when the library is not staffed. One of the most prized books in the library's collection is the Vulgate bible of Aslak Bolt (1430–1450), Norway's only preserved liturgical handwritten manuscript from medieval times. The book itself is estimated to have been written around 1250.
