We apologize for the inconvenience this causes you, our patrons and community friends, but please understand this work is needed and will be accomplished as rapidly as possible.

Again, here are the projects that will be addressed during the closure:

- Updating the elevator control systems
- Updating the smoke and fire detection panel
- Refreshing the main floor meeting room (Fresh paint; replace stained floor and ceiling tiles)
- Seal and re-line the parking lots (the parking lots will be closed to all vehicle, bicycle, and pedestrian traffic for several days during this project)
- Correct several lighting issues

Showcasing Our Local Authors! Nora Nickum



In 2021, I tagged along on a boat to marvel at a dog who can sniff out whale scat from a mile away. I visited a lighthouse on San Juan Island to chat with an expert about the mystery of why whales breach out of the water. I hurried to Fort Ward, here on Bainbridge, when alerted by an Orca Network post that orcas were approaching. I stood on the banks of the Cedar River, near Seattle, and watched a Chinook salmon dig a place for her eggs. All these field trips, and more, were intended to make sure I'd have plenty of good stories to bring things to life for readers of my nonfiction book–but they also made the research and writing process incredibly fun! The final result,

Superpod: Saving the Endangered Orcas of the Pacific Northwest, came out this April from Chicago Review Press.

I've always loved writing, but I started focusing on writing children's books about four years ago when my daughter was a toddler. My stories tend to feature ocean animals in some way. Sometimes they're the main focus, like with this book about orcas. Sometimes they make a fun and brief appearance, like in my forthcoming picture book, This Book is Full of Holes (Peachtree, spring 2024) which includes whale blowholes and the breathing holes that seals make in Arctic ice but also terrestrial examples like wiffle ball holes and potholes.

The steady thread of marine inspiration comes from having grown up on Bainbridge Island, exploring tidepools and keeping an eye out for animals like seals and herons. It also comes from my current day job at the Seattle Aquarium, where I lead ocean policy work and have fun taking breaks from my desk to visit the wolf eels, sea otters, and octopus.

Superpod is particularly geared toward kids and teens but written hopefully to also appeal to adults looking for a fun read. You'll meet individual orcas, like Grandmother Shachi and spunky Tofino, as well as scientists who are studying them using everything from underwater microphones to suction-cup tags. I hope you'll check it out at the library or the bookstore and recommend it to any animal-loving kids you know. You can find more info on my website: www.noranickum.com.

Have You Seen This Library?




The **Kansas City Public Library** is a public system headquartered in the Central Library in Kansas City, Missouri. The system operates its Central Library and neighborhood branches located in Kansas City, Independence, and Sugar Creek. Founded on December 5, 1873, it is the oldest and third largest public library system in the Kansas City metropolitan area. Its special collections, housed in the Central Library's Missouri Valley Room, has a collection of Kansas City local history, including original and published materials, news articles, post cards, photographs, maps, and city directories dating from the community's earliest history. The Library's Ramos Collection includes books, pamphlets, journal articles, and other materials relating to African American history and culture.
