Island Theatre Presents

a two-session (8 hours total)

Ten-Minute Playwriting Workshop October 1 and October 8 9:00 - 1:00 both days held at the Bainbridge Public Library

Back by popular demand! Island Theatre is excited to present a ten-minute playwriting course led by professional playwright and teacher Kristina Sutherland Rowell. Kristina taught this course for Island Theatre in 2019 and participants asked us to bring her back for more. So now, with the pandemic behind us, we're doing just that.

This two-session, 8-hour course is for new and seasoned playwrights alike. Students will learn and experiment with the core fundamentals of playwriting while focusing on the ten-minute play format. You'll discuss and debate what makes a "good" ten-minute play. And through a series of timed exercises and group games, you'll create characters, write dialogue, and share your work out loud in a fast-paced, inclusive, safe, and fun environment. Class size is limited to 15 so that each student receives personal attention.

This course is perfect for anyone who wants to submit a play for Island Theatre's 2024 Ten-Minute Play Festival, learn the fundamentals of playwriting, or brush up their playwriting skills.

Kristina is a playwright and teaching artist with over 20 years of professional teaching experience. She has led playwriting courses for adult learners at ACT Theatre, Seattle Repertory Theater, and Macha Monkey Productions and has taught hundreds of beginning to advanced playwriting students. She is the author of several critically acclaimed plays including With Dignity, Thebes and Franklin and Figaro. Her play Nancy, Frank, and Joe, co-written with Desiree Prewitt, was nominated for the Steinberg/ATCA New Play Award in 2010.

About Island Theatre. Island Theatre provides high-quality theater in intimate settings for adults who like to think. Our regular schedule includes Island Theatre at the Library— staged dramatic play-readings at the Bainbridge Public Library; Island Theatre at Your House ("YoHo")—potluck play-readings in private homes at which guests are welcome to read a part; and the annual Island Theatre Ten Minute Play Festival, a showcase of original short plays by Kitsap playwrights in live, fully-staged, multi-day performances featuring dozens of local actors and directors.

Run entirely by volunteers, Island Theatre is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization supported by patron donations, the Bainbridge Community Foundation, the City of Bainbridge Island Cultural Fund, Rotary Club of Bainbridge Island, and One Call for All.

Coming Soon Bainbridge Public Library Garden Fund


Your Facilities Team

Megan Chance




Megan Chance is the bestselling, critically acclaimed author of several novels. Her novel Bone River was an Amazon Book of the Month, A Drop of Ink was an Editor's Choice from the Historical Novel Society, and An Inconvenient Wife was an IndieNext pick. Critics love the work of Megan Chance. Booklist calls her writing "Provocative and haunting." "Magical," says The Kitsap Sun. "Stellar characterization, terrific dialogue," praises Publishers Weekly. "Impossible to stop reading," raves the Seattle Times. In addition to her historical fiction novels, A Dangerous Education, A Splendid Ruin (2021), A Drop of Ink (2017) The Visitant (2015), Inamorata (2014), Bone River (2012), City of Ash (2011), Prima Donna (2009), The Spiritualist (2008), An Inconvenient Wife (2004) and Susannah Morrow (2002), Ms. Chance is the author of the young adult Fianna Trilogy, short stories, and eight historical romance novels. Her novels have been translated into several different languages. She is also a popular workshop speaker whose speaking credits include the Pacific Northwest Writers Conference, Romance Writers of America National Conference, Edmonds Write on the Sound Conference, the Assistance League, Timberland Regional Libraries, and many others. Ms. Chance was born in Columbus, Ohio, and moved to Washington State as a girl. She is a graduate of Western Washington University. Megan Chance lives in the Pacific Northwest.

Die Around Sundown By Mark Pryor

In German-occupied Paris of 1940, Inspector Henri Lefort has been given just five days to solve the murder of a German major that took place in the Louvre Museum. Blocked from the crime scene as well as access to any real clues, but given a list of German-supplied suspects, Henri must use his wits. He encounters a psychoanalyst trained by Freud and a web of artists, including Pablo Picasso, who know more than they are willing to share. Faced with impossible odds, utterly cruel German officers, and a ticking clock, Lefort's case is atmospheric, engaging and keeps readers of the edge of their seats. Fans of WWII mysteries will find this darkly comic and tightly plotted tale (book one of a new series) full of historical intrigue and wonderful descriptions of Paris.

Have You Seen This Library?





It is the Camden, Maine Public Library. The first library established in Camden was known as the Federal Society's Library and was started in 1796 with a collection of 200 books. At that time, Camden was a very small town consisting of 15 houses centered around the harbor. The Federal Society's Library operated for 34 years until the books were sold at auction.

Several years later, in 1854, the Ladies' Library Association opened in Mrs. Jesse Hosmer's house on Wood Street. The library later moved to the second floor of the Camden National Bank building and remained at this location until the disastrous fire of 1892 that destroyed the Camden business district.

On March 23, 1896, the citizens of Camden voted to establish a free public library to be known as the Camden Public Library. The proud townspeople of Camden raised the money to build this library through various fundraising efforts. No assistance was provided by library philanthropist Andrew Carnegie. Mary Louise Curtis Bok donated the land for the library in 1916. Parker Morse Hooper and Boston architect Charles G. Loring offered building plans. The cornerstone was laid on August 17, 1927, and the library opened its doors on June 11, 1928, with Miss Katherine W. Harding serving as the first librarian.

In 1996 the library underwent a great expansion under the south lawn. The opening of this Centennial Wing allowed the library to accommodate larger collections and computer-based technology without compromising the scenic or historic value of the original building. Today the library is a true treasure of the coast of Maine and is a testament to the pride and determination of the residents of Camden.
