## Beignets and Martinis: A Studio and Plein Air Art Exhibit of Friends Who Paint together Dec 6 – Dec 31, 2024.

Welcome to our exhibit showcasing friendship and art! The Beignets and Martinis show features original artwork by ten local women artists. These artists first met and began painting together over 10 years ago at the Winslow Art Center (WAC) on Bainbridge Island, founded by Martha Jordan. Friendships and talents blossomed and grew at the many in-person workshops, classes, and gallery shows at Winslow Art Center.

In 2020, when COVID-19 restricted most in-person gatherings, and Winslow Art Center was forced to go online, Martha set up Zoom calls and we named our group "Beignets and Martinis". Although some are primarily studio painters, many met outside and painted "en plein air." As restrictions have lifted, Beignets and Martinis, meet to paint indoors as well as en plein air, and thus our exhibit combines both studio and plein air works. ### The State of Publishing 2024

I have published with the gamut of publishers, from a small feminist press in Oregon that expected to be in business for five years and is going on thirty-five, to the mass-market, mass publicity machine of Chronicle Books. Technologies have come and gone (remember the FAX machine?) while people keep writing stories.

Also, trends in the popularity of certain stories have changed. What I believe was a modest business in children's books has turned into a multi-million-dollar business. I participate in this market every year, by buying books for my sister's four grandchildren. I keep thinking I should write a children's book, but my stories are inevitably for adults or children with an odd sense of humor and history.

As the technology has changed, the price of printing a book has been drastically reduced, so that small-press publishers can compete with the big

boys and girls in the marketplace. Given a smart and engaged marketing team, a modest book can make it big. Right now, a small press I helped found in 1991, Raven Chronicles Press, is in the process of republishing my three novels set in 19th Century Mexico. When a book goes out of print (meaning, the press will no longer print new copies), an author can ask for their rights to publish back from the press. They can then keep it out of print (causing scarcity), resell the rights, or engage in a hybrid model of a press choosing to print a book, while the author contributes to the overall costs. In this case, I am helping to pay for a publicist. This is called hybrid publishing. I also have a traditional book coming out from a small press in Baltimore, Rosarium Press, which suits the book better than a larger publisher might have.

Another path is the Amazon Publishing route. I have not tried this, but I know perfectly legitimate writers who left traditional publishing to pursue the Amazon route. The author in this model is expected to maintain a high Amazon and social media profile, as well as cultivate an online following.

More than in the past when a writer could stay home with their pipe and their cat, the author is expected to go out and be present in the public realm. They must give readings at libraries and bookstores; perhaps staging publicity events complete with swag and photo ops with fans. This is not entirely new. Mark Twain, Edgar Allan Poe, and others made a living giving public readings of their work.

New modes of engagement mean that authors can take Zoom calls from the comfort of their home, reaching far more people than was possible through the old-fashioned publicity tour. Barbara Kingsolver tells the story of her first publicity tour, when she took one outfit, which she had cleaned at the hotel each night, and her cowboy boots. She managed to lock herself out of her room while wearing only a long tee shirt and her boots and had to knock on someone's door to have them call the front desk for her. You can imagine how tired she was to do that. That never happened to me, but I am grateful for the choices available now for publicizing a book.

Write the book before you start worrying about such things. Do not worry if you are writing for adults or children, English speakers or Chinese or Cambodian or ASL If you can engage with other writers and readers, do so. If there is a market, it will find you. But they must know you are there. Again, write the book first. Make it the best book you can and see what happens. A book is not about words, but people. Tell a good story.

Finally, give back. Support your local library and bookstore. Volunteer to teach a class at BARN, the library, or on your own. And guess what? More people will know about your book, or would-be book, or book dream. They want to read it.

For the last ten years or so, Kathleen has written essays and short stories. She is also working on a novel based on the life of Al-Mu'tamid Ibn Abad, the last taifa king of Seville, set in 11th Century al-Andalus.

During the pandemic, she began studying poetry for the first time and writing qasidas, an ancient, pre-Islamic form of middle eastern poetry. When she has finished a small set, she hopes to find an illustrator for a chapbook.

Her next novel is forthcoming from Rosarium Publishing in 2025. It is called Why Stars Burn, and is - a paranormal love story? Another Los Angeles scam? Or what happens when you fall in love with a mysterious stranger.

Bainbridge is home to many distinguished and hugely popular authors. In this column, we will profile a local author each month. Many will already be favorites, but we may just introduce you to a new author whose profile will send you right to the library to pick up a new read! 

Island Theatre is now accepting submissions of ten-minute plays for our 2025 Ten-Minute Play Festival! Submission deadline is February 14, 2025. The theme for the 2025 Festival is ESCAPE. What does ESCAPE suggest to you? Is it an escape from. . . or an escape to? Is it a physical escape. . . or an escape in which one never takes a physical step? Is it bold or surreptitious? Sudden or long planned? An act of choiceless desperation or one of powerful self-assertion? Is "escape" the beginning of the story or the end? Or is it the pivot point that dramatically changes the action? What you make of ESCAPE is up to you – just make sure it's central to your story.

The competition is open to all Kitsap County playwrights – experienced and aspiring – high school age and above. To be a "Kitsap County playwright" means you currently live or work in Kitsap County, or you lived or worked here for a substantial period in the past. The plays will be chosen from all the submissions by a panel of theatre professionals and the Island Theatre board of directors and announced in April. The chosen plays will be produced in four fully staged performances at the Buxton Center for the Arts on Bainbridge Island during Island Theatre's Ten-Minute Play Festival in August 2025.




Have You Seen This Library?

You will find an information booth at the entrance to the Main Barn, where you can look for your favorite subjects, or pick up a brochure that will guide you through the property. We are always open to questions and are available to assist you if you become overwhelmed and your vision begins to blur. (If this happens to you, just sit down and place your head between two books and breathe deeply until your head clears.) Most days we can count on friendly visits from "old faithfuls" – customers and friends who come in at least once a week if not every day to talk about books or the issues of the day. We also get a great number of people coming in to sell us books. Part of the fun is that we never know what kinds of books are going to come in on any given day. Fall Strolls at Bloedel Reserve




# BLOEDEL

## **Books Worth Sharing**

It is spring in 1963, and George Smiley has retired from the Circus. With the wreckage of the West's spy war against the Soviets strewn across Europe, he has eyes only for a more peaceful life. And indeed, with his marriage more secure than ever, there is a rumor that George Smiley might almost be happy. But Control has other plans. A Russian agent has defected in the most unusual of circumstances, and the man he was sent to kill in London is nowhere to be found. Smiley reluctantly agrees to one last simple task: interview Szusanna, a Hungarian émigré and employee of the missing man, and sniff out a lead. But the rules of the game have changed since Gorge retired and he must rethink his strategies. Set in the missing decade between two iconic instalments in John le Carré's George Smiley saga, The Spy Who Came in from the Cold and Tinker Tailor Soldier Spy, Karla's Choice marks a momentous return to the world of spy fiction's greatest writer. Nick Harkaway, the son of the great John Le Carre, has made his father proud in this latest addition to the George Smiley saga.
