## Art in the Library!

Happy New Year and celebrate with our January artist, Sharon Johnson, hosting an opening reception for her exhibit titled "From Boston to Bainbridge Island" on First Friday Art Walk, January 3, 5-7PM in the library meeting room. Here is Sharon's description of her work:

#### **Artist Statement**

An invitation to join me in my paintings....

I am the daughter of a boatbuilder so perhaps heritage plays a role in my obsession to paint the ocean and the boats that sail on it. Many of us enjoy the lure of the sea for various reasons and I invite you to immerse yourself in my seaside vistas and dream. But everything is not the sea. In life at my cottage on Bainbridge Island, or in my paintings, there is a feeling of "hygge" that I hope to share with you in my paintings whether they be of the garden, a musical inspiration, a landscape, or a simple subject that has caught my attention. I prefer subjects with a story or ones that remind me that the world is still a beautiful place no matter what is going on in it, and I try to inspire them with the paintings I create. A lifetime of learning, schooling, and mentors have been integral to the technical side of my art education, but nothing has been as important to me as learning to invoke a response from someone looking at my work and hearing, "I can see myself there" or "do you know what this reminds me of?" It is then that the conversation begins, stories and experiences are exchanged, and the painting comes to life. Perhaps each time it is viewed, the story changes and you wonder what it might have been or what it will be. There is a good feeling. Success.



"Bainbridge Island" is an original oil painting and is the first I have done of the Island since moving here from Boston. To me, the colors are the spirit of the island and there is a suggestion that if the sun comes out it will be even more beautiful. It speaks to the history of the Salish people who have called this area home for so many years and the natural beauty that we strive to protect. I can imagine a centuries old canoe setting out to fish or a modern ferry skimming the waters - either way, an amazing and ever-changing experience. (Available in print form.) #### **The Madison Ave Bundled Project**

Undoubtedly, there are few-to-no folks on island who won't be happy when the construction on Madison is finally complete. BPL and KRL watched in awe as our patrons managed to find our Madison Ave entrance and exit despite the confusing array of cones and caution tape. Hang in there, "The End is In Sight!"



#### A throw back in history . . .

When the Madison Ave / High School Rd roundabout was installed many years ago (our very first, and maybe the first in the county!), the library's garden volunteers, the Friday Tidies, volunteered to plant an array of vegetation in the center of the roundabout. At the time, it was felt that taller plants would reduce vehicular speed navigating through the intersection, and thereby make for a safer intersection.

Time has passed, and we've grown more accustomed to maneuvering through roundabouts. As part of the Madison Ave Bundled Project, it was determined that by removing the taller plantings in the roundabout, there would be improved visibility, particularly to spot pedestrians navigating the intersection. Welcome back, Friday Tidies! The Tireless Tidies stepped up to remove the plants and shrubs they'd planted years before. And now, the visibility issue has improved. Yea, Friday Tidies! You're the best! (There will be new plantings, but they will be shorter.)



In closing, we have a busy year ahead. On our Facilities Agenda we have: a) to improve safety and aesthetic concerns we will: 1) install new pathway lights in the Haiku Garden; 2) install additional hand railings for our exterior stairways; b) to improve comfort and access, we will add a new bench in the Haiku Garden; c) to become better stewards of our natural resources, we will continue our research into installing solar panels on the roof of the library, as well as to pursue applying for available grants and programs to help defray the costs.

Stay tuned . . . it's going to be fun ride!

#### A Shout-Out for Help

- oversee the project through completion.



Island Theatre is now accepting submissions of ten-minute plays for our 2025 Ten-Minute Play Festival! Submission deadline is February 14, 2025. The theme for the 2025 Festival is ESCAPE. What does ESCAPE suggest to you? Is it an escape from. . . or an escape to? Is it a physical escape. . . or an escape in which one never takes a physical step? Is it bold or surreptitious? Sudden or long planned? An act of choiceless desperation or one of powerful self-assertion? Is "escape" the beginning of the story or the end? Or is it the pivot point that dramatically changes the action? What you make of ESCAPE is up to you – just make sure it's central to your story.

The competition is open to all Kitsap County playwrights – experienced and aspiring – high school age and above. To be a "Kitsap County playwright" means you currently live or work in Kitsap County, or you lived or worked here for a substantial period in the past. The plays will be chosen from all the submissions by a panel of theatre professionals and the Island Theatre board of directors and announced in April. The chosen plays will be produced in four fully staged performances at the Buxton Center for the Arts on Bainbridge Island during Island Theatre's Ten-Minute Play Festival in August 2025.

From 11 am until 1 pm on Sunday, February 9th Bainbridge Public Library and Eagle Harbor Book Company will host the second joint celebration of local book clubs in the meeting room of the library. The event will include presentations from publisher's representatives, drawings for books and swag, light refreshments, and books for purchase from Eagle Harbor. This will be a free ticketed event. Island Theatre presents "This Wide Night," the moving story of two women, recently released from prison, who are attempting to navigate the world "outside" and challenges to the friendship they developed "inside."

Performances take place at the Bainbridge Public Library on Saturday, January 25 at 7:00 pm and Sunday, January 26 at 3:00 pm. Admission is by minimum donation of \$5. No reservations are necessary. It is recommended for high school age and up. Both performances of the one-hour play will be followed by an audience discussion with the director and actors. On Sunday, special guest State Representative Tara Simmons, who has served time herself and focuses, as a legislator, on the criminal justice system, will discuss what is happening in Washington State and issues facing women as they re-enter society.

"This Wide Night" is directed by Jeffrey Brown and features Charlie Malo and Terrace Yeatts. The piece was commissioned by the English theatre group Clean Break, which was created by two prisoners in 1979. Today, the group commissions an annual original production, which then tours theatres and prisons in England. They also run an education program, focused on skills helpful to re-entry, including theatrical skills. They work in prisons, and with young women at risk.

Have You Seen This Library Exhibit?



The real Winnie-the-Pooh won't be found on a video, in a movie, on a T-shirt, or a lunchbox. Since 1987, Pooh and four of his best friends—Eeyore, Piglet, Kanga, and Tigger—have been living at The New York Public Library.

Long before Walt Disney turned Pooh and his pals into movie stars, Christopher Robin Milne, a very real little boy living in England, received a small stuffed bear on his first birthday. He named him Edward Bear (later renamed Winnie-the-Pooh). Following Edward came the rest of the stuffed animals, which Christopher loved and played with throughout his childhood.

One day, Christopher's father, A. A. Milne, and an artist named Ernest H. Shepard, decided that these animals, and two other imaginary friends, Owl and Rabbit, would make fine characters in a bedtime story. From that day on, Pooh and his friends have had many fanciful adventures, from Piglet's encounter with a Heffalump to Eeyore's loss of his tail. These stories have been embraced by millions of children and adult readers for more than 70 years.

Winnie-the-Pooh and his pals are now a vital part of the <u>Polonsky Exhibition</u> <u>of The New York Library's Treasures</u>, which opened in 2021. Pooh and his friends are as happy as when they lived in the Hundred Acre Wood. <u>See more about Winnie the Pooh here.</u>



#### Whale Fall By Elizabeth O'Connor

In September 1938, a whale washes ashore on a remote, sparsely populated Welsh Island. Rumors of another World War are seeping to the island and the minister suggests the whale may have fallen to a Grman submarine. But the superstitious populace has other thoughts, linked to myths and legends. Eighteen-year-old Manod sees the whale as an omen. Fresh from finishing her studies in the Island's one room school, she sees the whale as a link to the world beyond. When a pair of ethnographers from Oxford University arrive to study the whale and document the island's customs, they employ Manod as a translator, giving her even more thoughts of a wider life. But she struggles with being an object of their anthropological gaze, with their romantic misrepresentations of her culture, and with what it would mean to leave the island. This slender story is a powerful meditation on what it means to be seen from the outside and how hard it is to break away from the

present for a chance at a very different future. This is a prime candidate for book group selection!
