Art in the Library!

Who among us doesn't celebrate the return of light and the end of winter? Our March artists, Donald Hazeltine and Lora Jansson mark that return with their exhibit titled "The Point of Light" and "Move On" with an opening reception for First Friday Art Walk, March 7, 5-7PM in the library meeting room.

Here is Don's bio and artist statement:

In the late 1970s, I became a background artist at Coffin & Company Motion Pictures, a commercial animation studio in Seattle. I bloomed under Jim Coffin's direction, concepting as part of his team of designers and animators.

As I grew more independent and confident in my thinking, it became difficult to present ideas I believed in with a passion only to have a client reject them out of hand. This was the planted seed that caused me to think apart from the commercial world of solving the client's needs and looking into what I might create for myself individually, without the overbearing intrusion of a client's gaze.

Prior to this, I hadn't thought of myself as a "fine artist". I wasn't an intellectual or a scholar; the art school I attended in the late 1960s was specifically commercial in its application. However, even then my favorite instructor at the school was the design teacher Fred Griffin, a fine artist.

Fred was a painter and materials fabricator and probably the first genius I'd ever met. We connected through a shared interest - old comic strips and a new, emerging idea, the graphic novel. He used those forms to reveal to me an entire universe of visual relationships I had been looking at but had never seen.

The final revelation was seeing reproductions of the work of Mark Rothko. That was when I experienced my first sense of transcendence in art. I became less interested in the figure and more in the space surrounding the figure - the landscape.

While there were many years left to go in my maturation, marred by depression, alcohol, and the land mines of childhood, I was eventually able to become, and remain, a fine artist.

I've attempted to find the best words to describe my own comprehension of what I do: Abstraction and representation, Ancient and Present

I celebrate the fierce energy and all the colors of life. When I paint abstracts, I feel like I am drinking colors, and those colors fill my soul. It feels to me as if the paintings are

creating me. It's a great irony that I started to paint at the age of 72 because I was losing my vision. My creative passions – writing and shamanism – broke down after a decade of trauma.

I needed a creative outlet to keep my soul from withering. So, the day after my 72nd birthday, I started to paint. This is my first public showing. My process starts when I am suddenly drawn into the

studio by a force I cannot defy (and don't want to). I never have any idea what I am going to paint. I go by feeling, mixing bold color and various media, by distressing a

canvas or panel. Somehow, I end up with an emotional portrait of that moment. Painting has saved my sanity because beauty is a form of both love and resistance.

Facilities Report

Greetings, Library Lovers!

This month we're happy to provide a "Sneak Peek" of an exciting, forthcoming addition to the library's wonderful Haiku Garden.

Consulting Mike Rehber, Community Outreach Liaison for the BARN Wood Working Shop, we developed a design for a new bench to be built and installed in the garden in the very near future.

The library paid for the materials; BARN provided the equipment and space; and a team of BARN woodworkers, over the course of eight weeks, created what we consider to be a wonderful example of "community-oriented functional art!"

Seen below in the picture on the left are the hand-picked, rough sawn Sapele boards purchased at Edensaw Woods, Ltd in Port Townsend. To the right of the boards in the same picture are some of the templates the team built to guide in the cutting and shaping of the bench's many component parts. In the middle picture, the team is in the early stages of cutting and shaping

the boards.

And in the picture on the left, the bench has taken shape! Since it will be outside and exposed to our PNW climate, it will receive multiple coats of wood-penetrating and sealing finish.






We can't wait to see it in its new home! And of course we'll shout out its arrival from the rooftops!





Clear By Carys Davies

It is 1843, near the end of the Scottish Clearances. Impoverished minister John Ferguson agrees to travel to a remote island between Shetland and Norway to evict its last resident, for a meager sum. His wife Mary is skeptical and wary of his risky decision. Upon arrival at the island, John falls and is seriously injured. It is Ivar, the man John has come to evict, who rescues him and returns him to health. In the process these men with no common language, culture or experience form a unique and powerful friendship. Ivar is no stranger to the upheaval in Scotland and John begins to question the value of his mission. Their story is unforgettable! Notable Welsh novelist Davies has crafted a stunning novel of friendship, politics and the value of faith that left me both breathless and deeply moved.


