Facilities Report

Greetings, Library Lovers!

Last month's article provided a "Sneak Peek" of the VERY handsome new bench that's coming to the Haiku Garden, This month we, like Mother Nature herself, are providing some enticing, early spring, "Sneak Peek" photos of the emerging growth and tantalizing blooms that foretell the colorful bounty of abundance our community enjoys throughout the year in the gardens surrounding the library.

Additionally, we are pleased to announce the completion of the repair of the hearing assist Hearing Loop in the large upstairs meeting room. The service interruption had gone undetected for a period of time, and when finally discovered, proved difficult to trouble shoot. Eventually the cause of the failure was identified, and a repair completed. So, community members whose hearing aids are equipped with telecoils, may benefit from improved volume and clarity when speakers utilize our system's microphone. Community members without telecoil-equipped hearing aids may ask to borrow the system's Hearing Loop-compatible headsets that may provide enhanced range and volume of the speaker's presentation. Yay!

And that's not all! We are in the process of installing a second system in the meeting room to accommodate people with hearing difficulties. With the dizzying advances in technology, there are hearing aids that connect via an app to the user's mobile phone; the app in the mobile phone picks up the surrounding sound, filters it, and passes it along to the hearing aid in the user's ear. It's an exciting enhancement we will soon be offering!



In 1912, shortly after Curie won the Nobel Prize for her discovery of radium and polonium, French paparazzi uncovered her secret love affair with a married physicist. The ensuing scandal all but erased her achievements from public memory and threatened her career. Demoralized and lambasted as a "foreign" Jewish temptress, Marie agrees to join her friend and colleague Hertha Ayrton, an electromechanical engineer and suffragette, at her summer home in England. "The Half-Life of Marie Curie" explores the powerful friendship of these two brilliant women, both of whom are mothers, widows, and fearless champions of scientific inquiry. "The Half-Life of Marie Curie" is directed by Tracy Dickerson and features Nora Harrison as Marie Curie and Ruth Bookwalter as Hertha Ayrton.



Have You Seen This Library?



It is the Beach Library in Albena, Bulgaria!

The Black Sea is the resting place for over 25 rivers, flowing from just as many countries. It has over 11 names, depending on which coastline you are viewing from, and its brackish waters are home to countless shipwrecks, myths and fairy tales. Some modern archaeologists argue it is the final resting place of the real Atlantis. The ancient Greeks believed it to be the entrance to the kingdom of the dead. The islands that bedeck the surface of the water are sanctuaries for unique fauna and flora that can be found hardly anywhere else on Earth. In short, it is a place of incredible stories, where cultures flow past and through each other.

Along the Bulgarian coast, Albena is a vacation town, a spritely mix of beach umbrellas, pool floaties and green forests, a stark contrast to the dark and foreboding reputation of the Black Sea along which it resides. Albena sought to capitalize on its myth-like reputation by creating a cache of international stories, resting right in the sand.

The Bulgarian name for the Albena beach library translates into English as 'bookcrossing,' that is, a kind of crossroads where people from across the world leave their stories and pick up ones they may have never heard before. Like much of Albena's surrounding architecture, it's simple, arguably brutalist. It is not florid or showy, but invitingly efficient and helpful. If you forgot your beach book, don't worry: the beach library has everything you need.

German architect Herman Kompernas was hired to design the structure – a simple set of white wooden shelves, weather treated to withstand the many


moods of the Black Sea's atmospheres. "We found a material that is very resistant to sun and water" said Kompernas in 2013. "We chose a sort of pallet construction for under the library to make it very stable against the wind."

The shelves rest right in the sand, staring out into the expanse of the ocean, awaiting whatever Albena's transient crowd of beachcombers might bring its way. The shelves were initially loaded with a mix of thrillers, adventures, memoirs, children's books, detective stories and romances. However, over time, the genres and languages have expanded, as visitors are encouraged to leave their own books behind as well. Currently, over 6000 books rest on the shelves in over 15 languages (maybe more, depending on who the sea has washed up that morning). Vinyl shields are dropped down over the shelves like curtains during the rainy season, to prevent damage to the books. The library is tended by a small group of beach librarians, whose job it is to keep things organized. Like any library, they do encourage you to bring back your book after you've finished. The library is located on the beach in front of Hotel Kaliakra (9620 Albena, Bulgaria). The library has no postal address or phone number, but it is kept alive by Albena Resort, which can be found at Albena, bg.

There are three libraries now on the beach in Albena, but the original is still in front of Hotel Kaliakra.

Books Worth Sharing



Bottom of the 33rd By Dan Barry

In honor of baseball season, I am sharing Dan Barry's wonderful 2011 book about the longest baseball game in history. On April 18, 1981, the International League game between the Rochester Red Wings and the Pawtucket Red Sox was tied two all at 3:30 a.m. in the 31st inning. In baseball you win, or you lose, so baseball players play baseball until the call and the signal of the final out. So, for eight hours the players played, the announcer announced, and the sportswriter with hopes of journalistic fame

took notes, as an increasingly sleepy knot of devoted fans stayed in the stands. You would think a book about a single game of baseball would be a bore, but Dan Barry teases every nuance out of his writerly toolkit to tell this spellbinding and totally charming tale. It's the story of perseverance and ambition, endurance and dreams, small town life, and every minor-leaguer's greatest hope. It is a meditation on America's favorite pastime that is not to be missed.
