Art in the Library!

Since the Grand Old Fourth of July celebration lands on First Friday, our First Friday opening reception will move to Saturday, July 5 (with the rest of Bainbridge galleries downtown). Our July artist, Justin Johnson, will host the reception opening his exhibit titled "Yellowstone" from 5-7PM in the library meeting room.

Justin comments:

My work for this show is a celebration of our wild- uniquely American animals and untamed places they call home. Each oil painting begins before the brush touches canvas: I handcrafted the wood panels and frames to paint on. This show and theme of Yellowstone is inspired by my fascination with our wild places here and how important it is for us to protect and enjoy them. I have visited Yellowstone as a child, and as an adult and feel it is a great way to share a uniquely American experience for this July Art exhibit. Through paint, I hope to honor these wild animals and landscapes- and to invite others to slow down, look closer, and remember what's worth protecting.

We're Going Solar! (with your help)



The Bainbridge Public Library (BPL) is the non-profit organization that owns, operates, and maintains the library building and grounds. The BPL board leadership recognized an opportunity to leverage the unique design of the library building and its large roof surface to reduce the carbon footprint of the library while maintaining its historic beauty. The BPL board has approved the installation of solar panels on the library roof with the following objectives: reducing energy costs, creating a solar energy educational component, and demonstrating prudent stewardship of this cherished community resource. After an extensive search and vetting process, a vendor has been selected. The decision was based on design, system components, cost, and payback timeline. The project timeline has a target completion date of no later than December 2025. This timeline is critical in order to be eligible to realize government rebate incentives and to lock in materials prices. BPL will be seeking funding from PSE, federal rebates, Rotary, and individual donors to fund the project. We are excited to engage the community and Rotary Club of Bainbridge Island in this innovative project. To donate to this important community project click here.

Another upgrade to the Haiku Garden ... New lighting!

The original pathway lights were installed in 1998 when the garden was created through the generous donation of time, money, expertise, and physical hard work by members of the Bainbridge Island Japanese American Community (BIJAC). They have been replaced with handsome lights that fill the garden with a gentle illumination that is in keeping with the intended theme of peace and serenity in the garden. The improved lighting also makes it easier to find one's way through the garden if parked in the north parking lot off High School Rd.



Featuring Local Authors - John Fox



Sequestered in his chateau tower, ruminating in his "slippered leisure," Montaigne crafted personal essays to candidly state his ideas, preferences, dislikes and even his prejudices. "Many things which I would not say in public I say in private and send my most loyal friends to a bookshop to learn my most secret studies or thoughts."

Montaigne created the personal essay. We've all had teachers tell us to "write about what you know," and I've often stumbled when I strayed from that path. "What we write is who we are," said Henry David Thoreau, who penned millions of journal words to continually become very much himself.

E.B. White, also a master of the personal essay, self-effacingly said "only a person who is congenitally self-centered has the effrontery and the stamina to write essays." And glad are we that the sweet creator of Charlotte's Web, also wrote personal essays, which he warned is to "expose your private parts without removing your trousers."

A mythical Little Old Lady has been widely quoted as saying "My goodness, how will I know what I think until I read what I've written?" That's the trouble with writing personal essays: What you thought when you began is so often different when you finish. And if you aren't overthinking as you putter along, new ideas float unbidden into your meandering consciousness.

"What you write chooses you," said American playwright Horton Foote, "your living is your preparation for your writing." Each of us has a story to tell, even if only to an audience of one. What a challenge to craft an essay to first please yourself, then to be able to engage, or to amuse, or to inform others.

Oh my, you have so many memories you would so much like to share with

the eagerly waiting wider world! What an interesting life you've led! Favorite teachers, college flunkouts, lost loves, idiot bosses. Vivid narratives to be sure, but in self-editing I always apply the "Who gives?" test, my teenage son's ever-irreverent challenge to my nuggets of wise advice. No matter how vivid my memories are, how do they contribute to any larger life lessons? What is the point I want to make?

My final editing step always is to ruthlessly apply Rule 13 in Strunk & [E.B.] White's dandy little writing guide, "The Elements of Style." Which is, tersely stated, "Omit needless words." Which I just did. \sim John Fox


Have You Seen This Library?



Yes, you probably have if you've been to Sitka, Alaska. Sitka Public Library is a public library serving the City and Borough of Sitka since March 20, 1923. It is now tax supported but owes a great debt of gratitude to the Sitka Library Association, whose volunteers provided library service in Sitka for nearly fifty years. The building was built in 1967 with a gift from Theodore Kettleson, a long-time Sitka resident. Additional funds came from the Library Services and Construction Act, and gifts from other generous Sitka citizens. An addition, which more than doubled the library's size, was completed in 1983, and, more recently, an extensive library expansion/remodel broke ground in the fall of 2014, expanding the library by 60 percent. The library was temporarily moved to the old Stratton Library building on the old Sheldon Jackson College campus while work was completed on the building. The expansion was completed in February 2016, and the library reopened at 320 Harbor Drive on February 4, 2016, under the name Sitka Public Library. The community is justifiably proud of its beautiful setting and excellent library service.

Books Worth Sharing



Nightshade By Michael Connelly

Murder, kidnapping, poaching and political corruption are at the heart of this latest thriller from master Michael Connelly. Los Angeles County Sheriff's Detective Stilwell has been "exiled" to a low-key post policing rustic Catalina Island, after department politics drove him off a homicide desk. Normally a sleepy assignment, Stilwell gets a call about a body found in the harbor on the same day as a report of poaching on a protected reserve. With his hands full, he crosses all lines of protocol and authority as these cases rapidly begin to merge into one of greed and political malfeasance. He must work with an ex-colleague who wants him off the force and a potentially shady mainland DA to keep his evidence clean and get the bad guys put away. Connelly does a great job of portraying both the beauty and the dark side of Santa Catalina Island, the historical and scenic oasis just 26 miles off Los Angeles.
