



We're Going Solar!



The Bainbridge Public Library (BPL) is the non-profit organization that owns, operates, and maintains the library building and grounds. The BPL board leadership recognized an opportunity to leverage the unique design of the library building and its large roof surface to reduce the carbon footprint of the library while maintaining its historic beauty. The BPL board has approved the installation of solar panels on the library roof with the following objectives: reducing energy costs, creating a solar energy educational component, and demonstrating prudent stewardship of this cherished community resource.

After an extensive search and vetting process, a vendor has been selected. The decision was based on design, system components, cost, and payback timeline. The project timeline has a target completion date of no later than December 2025. This timeline is critical in order to be eligible to realize government rebate incentives and to lock in materials prices. BPL will be seeking funding from PSE, federal rebates, Rotary, and individual donors to fund the project. We are pleased to share that 100% of the Library Board and CoFun Committee have contributed to a \$25,000 matching gift which we now invite you to help meet. The total cost of the project is \$175,000. We are pursuing a combination of individual donations and grant funding to bring it to life. To meet our match and move forward, we hope to receive pledges by October 1. To donate to this important community project click here.

We're Celebrating Sun Day

On Sunday September 21, Bainbridge Island will be one of hundreds of communities across the country celebrating Sun Day. These gatherings celebrate the unstoppable rise of clean energy and the movement to leave fossil fuels behind. Our Sun Day celebration will be held at the Bainbridge Public Library from 11:00 to 12:30. To attend, please register here.

We will honor the library's plans to install a solar system on its roof this coming November. Jeremy Smithson, the founder of Puget Sound Solar, which will install the library's system, will review the history of solar in the U.S. and tell where the industry is now headed. You will also learn about other nearby projects that have solar or will be installing solar soon, including

the Suquamish tribe. The managers of several of those projects, as well as some homeowners who have installed solar, will serve as "Solar Ambassadors" to help you learn from their experience.

Sun Day celebrations across the country are sponsored by Third Act and widely promoted by founder Bill McKibben, who just released his latest book Here Comes the Sun. Bill will be speaking at Town Hall on September 16. You can get tickets here.

You will learn of the momentum for solar here and across the country and what more we can all do as we care for the Earth that sustains us. To attend, be sure to register here.



Facilities Report

And the beat of progress pounds on!

This month we highlight the addition of two new exterior handrails, installed to improve safety around our building. Pictured below, the custom-made handrails provide additional points of contact for those (of all ages!) maneuvering throughout the grounds the gardens.





The new curved railing serves the rustic stone stairs between the nationally recognized Fern Garden and the Children's Library entrance. And the new railing closest to the building serves the stairs between the north parking lot and the Haiku Garden. (Many folks don't know these stairs led to the original - 1962 - main entrance to the library which now serves as an Emergency Exit

from the non-fiction / "living room" area of the library.)



Featuring Local Authors - Mark Salvadalena



Birding Bainbridge Island (self-published, 194 pages, July 2025) is my guide to the birds and birding locations of the island. It began as my lecture notes for a birding course I teach through Bainbridge Island Parks, which grew over the years from my own observations, insights from mentors, and ideas drawn from countless bird books and online resources. Encouraged by my family, I decided to turn those notes into the kind of guide I would have wanted as a beginning birder.

Most of the book is made up of species that account for 115 birds. This is not an arbitrary number but the species I can reliably find and show people on field trips around the island throughout the year. For each species, I set out to answer a few key questions: When are they here? Do they breed locally? Where can they be found? What might you see them doing there, such as flying after insects, diving for fish, or nesting? I also include brief identification tips and notes on population history and trends.

The book also has short sections on good public birding spots and a monthby-month guide to seasonal changes, such as when migrants arrive or depart and how birds gather where food is abundant.

As I worked on the draft, I reached out to photographer John Knox, whose images I had long admired in a local Facebook group. His photos often capture action and interesting behaviors and seemed perfect for inspiring readers to get outside and see birds for themselves. I also created eBird-based graphics, drawing on data from the Cornell Lab's community science project, using light-to-dark shading to show seasonal presence. I found this approach more visually appealing than standard bar charts and less clunky than long text descriptions.


Once these elements came together, the finished book exceeded my expectations. In the coming years I hope to learn even more from local birders, replace the few stock photos, and work with editors and designers to produce an even stronger second edition.

An Inside Job By Daniel Silva

Legendary art restorer Gabriel Allon finds the body of a young woman in the Venetian lagoon. She's an intern at the Vatican tasked with the restoration of a painting in their storage vault, that just might be an undiscovered Da Vinci. The disappearance of her project sets off a firestorm in galleries, museums, and auction houses worldwide. Gabriel must leave Venice for Rome to assist in the hunt, protect the new Pope, and potentially authenticate a lost masterpiece. Murder, theft, greed, and international intrigue are touchstones of Silva's masterful thriller series, and this very timely tale may be his absolute best!
